2020 was a significant year for Cactus Cares by donating over 90,000 pounds of beef and pork to our local communities.

This is a testament to our employee-owners and partnership organizations. Their hard work has equipped Cactus Cares to address food insecurity in our communities. Over the past few months, I have had the privilege of traveling to each of our locations to tell the story about what Cactus Cares is and how you can get involved.

2020 was an unprecedented year in many ways and for Cactus Cares that was no exception. This year, we were able to set new milestones in our food donations in large part thanks to our university partners. Also, we were able to award over \$55,000 in scholarships to 30 of our employees or their families for the 2020-2021 school year.

The question is...what comes next? This year we have been hard at work creating

our 2021 strategic plan and we feel that we have a great road map for expanding on our success in 2020 and setting the course for the future. We will work to continue to expand feeding programs especially in Iowa, South Carolina, and Georgia; to enhance our employee-owners involvement through increased volunteer opportunities, employee-owner led committees, and supporting our employee-owners in telling the Cactus Cares story.

According to the High Plains Food Bank, requests for food assistance have increased nearly 20-fold throughout the Panhandle network since mid-March. In response to this increase, Cactus Cares is proud to have partnered with the local agriculture community and Hillside Christian Church to host multiple Pop-Up Food Pantries to help get high quality food into the homes of individuals who need it. The first pop-up pantry was hosted in Amarillo, Texas on May 8th. We are proud that thanks to our partnership with Caviness Beef Packers, all 2,000 recipients received five pounds of ground beef. In addition, each recipient received a dozen eggs, a pound of cheese, two gallons of milk, and five pounds of potatoes all donated by the local agriculture community. On May 30th, we hosted our second pop-up pantry in Levelland,

Texas. Here, 500 families received packs of food including five pounds of ground beef supplied by Cactus Cares and our partner, Red Raider Meats. The third pop-up pantry occurred on Saturday, June 13th, where 2,000 families in Lubbock, Texas received food packs including five pounds of ground beef. "When the agriculture community recognizes a need, they find a way to respond," said Wayne Craig, Executive Director of Cactus Cares. "Each of our industries has a commitment to serve our community, and this is just one way we can reach out and help our neighbors." Since these three pop-up pantries, Cactus Cares has partnered with Raider Red Meats and Hillside Christian Church to pass out food packs, including five pounds of ground beef, in local pop-up pantries every week since May. In total, Cactus Cares has donated 82,000 pounds of ground beef to help feed 16,400 families in our local communities.

World Food Prize

Each year, 200 exceptional high school students from around the world are selected to participate in the Global Youth Institute hosted by the World Food Prize Foundation. This year, Cactus Cares was honored to be a sponsor and speaker for the event.

Typically the Global Youth Institute is a three-day conference hosted in Des Moines, Iowa. However, this year the event was converted to a virtual platform. On Friday, October 9th, Wayne Craig and Shelby Padgett had the opportunity to present during the live event kick-off. This presentation included a video module on food insecurity. The module discussed the issue of hunger in schools in the United States, how weekend backpack programs and the role that Cactus Cares has played in helping to combat weekend hunger in our local communities. In addition, the module





challenged each of the students to create recipes using only items found in a weekend backpack program and to identify additional food items that should be offered in a weekend backpack program. The module included a workbook for the students to complete created by Cactus Cares. All resources including the module and workbook were posted for the participants to review throughout the entire conference.

Cactus Cares was also the sponsor of the Conference in a Box. With the conference transitioning to virtual, the World Food Prize decided to create a box of all the materials that the students would need to complete the conference. The boxes were then mailed to each participant and featured the conference and Cactus Cares logo.



Partnerships

Cactus Cares collaborates with local-level foundations and institutions to ensure a more sustainable source of food for the long-term.


In 2020, Cactus Cares had the opportunity to partner with numerous world-class operations focused on tangibly improving the communities where our family, friends, and neighbors are located. This annual report highlights some of these partnerships.



Eastridge Mission Center

Eastridge Mission Center (EMC) is an organization focused on bettering the Eastridge Community. This community is found in Northeast Amarillo. We began our partnership with Eastridge Mission Center as a supplier of protein for their "Kids Café"- a feeding opportunity where kids can come afterschool to receive nourishment. Our partnership expanded during the coronavirus pandemic when EMC began to put together food boxes for people in their local community. The food boxes were delivered to local residents during the heart of the pandemic from March – May. During this time, Cactus Cares provided 1,200 lbs. of ground beef for inclusion in these food boxes.

Eagle Market

Eagle Market is a student run high school Snack Shack program in

Hugoton, Kansas. These high school students pack weekend food bags for their fellow classmates. Cactus Cares is proud to have helped provide leadership in the creation of this program and our continued support includes supplying beef sticks for the bags.



Emi's Color Shoot

Emi's Color Shoot is a sporting clays event in Amarillo, Texas to provide support and awareness to the Texas Scottish Rite Hospital for Children. This shoot is led by multiple Cactus employees and Cactus Cares is honored to support the shoot each year in a variety of ways.



Amarillo Police Department

In July, we were excited to be a participant in the Amarillo Police Department Appreciation Day. As officers came off of their shift, they all received a package of steaks from Cactus thanking them for their hard work in our community. These steaks were sourced from WTAMU.



Cactus Cares was proud to sponsor the banner for the Hamilton County Fair Reserve Grand Champion Lightweight Commercial Gilt.



Heal the City is a program in Amarillo focused on providing for the medical needs of the uninsured while connecting them to existing community resources. This includes access to nutritious foods. Cactus Cares has worked with HTC to provide high quality protein for their food pantry for senior citizens.



During the VFW 1474's food drive, Cactus Cares donated 300 pounds of ground beef to their cause. The ground beef was sourced through West Texas A&M as part of the Cactus Cares University Meat Lab Program.



Snack Pak 4 Kids (SP4K) was one of the first organizations that Cactus partnered with in the fight against weekend hunger. Today, we still partner with SP4K as well as their Senior Shack program. We have helped seed SP4K programs in the following communities: Abernathy, Hereford, Hale Center, Fritch, Plainview, Spearman, River Road, Dumas, Stratford, and Kress.



Pass the Pork was an initiative by the lowa Pork Producers Association and the lowa Food Bank to help lowa pig farmers donate pigs to lowa Food Bank feeding programs. Cactus Cares was proud to participate in this local program.

SNAK-KITS

Snak-Kit is a local organization committed to providing weekend food items to help decrease hunger, so school-age children can focus on their learning.

170 kids served every week

Located in Manning, South Carolina, Snak-Kit was founded in 2019 in order to help alleviate weekend hunger within the local school district. This program was first introduced to Cactus Cares by a local employee. At the time the program was known as Sacks of Love. It was run by a local church, and they were supplying about 20 bags per week. This was a great effort, but the demand was much higher; therefore, kids were placed on a rotating waiting list to determine who would receive food that weekend. When we were introduced to the program, we provided leadership and sponsored local leaders in a training session in Amarillo to learn from Dyron Howell at Snack Pak 4 Kids about how he successfully runs their backpack programs. The leadership then went through the process of reorganizing the program and rebranding to Snak-Kits. Today, Snak-Kits is passing out 170 weekend food bags to children each week. They are currently in three schools within the local school district and are looking to continue expanding in the 2020-2021 school year.

University Meat Lab Programs

What is the program?

The Cactus Cares University Meat Lab Program was started in March 2020 when we began sourcing ground beef from the West Texas A&M Meat Lab-Doc's Prime Cuts. In this program, we purchase ground beef and ground pork from the University Meat Laboratory and donate the product to local food pantries and other organizations.

Multiplication Effect

This creates a multiplication effect- we are able to support both agricultural education and food pantries using the same dollar. The program started with WTAMU and has since expanded to also include Texas Tech University, Texas A&M University, and Iowa State University.

Continuing to expand in 2021



West Texas A&M University

West Texas A&M University was the first meat laboratory we partnered with, and it has remained one of our strongest partners. This year, we sourced 4,200 pounds of meat from Doc's Prime Cuts. This meat was used to serve 11 different organizations in the Texas Panhandle area.



These organizations include Eastridge Mission Center, Heal The City, VFW 1474, Amarillo Police Department, Sharing Hope, Acts Community Center, and Project Hope in Hugoton, Kansas. Through Doc's Prime Cuts, we are also able to make sure the on campus food pantry has access to high quality protein.



Texas Tech University

Texas Tech University was the second university that joined our University Meat Lab program. Texas Tech joined us during our Pop-Up Pantries in response to the COVID-19 pandemic. Texas Tech worked with Cactus Cares to supply 73,000 pounds of ground beef to close to 14,500 families. The first Cactus Cares- Texas Tech pop-up pantry occurred in Levelland, Texas in May.

Since then, a local church has stepped in to continue doing pop-up pantries every week and will continue through the end of the year. We have worked with Texas Tech to ensure that each recipient of the pop-up pantry has received approximately 5 pounds of ground beef for their family.



Iowa State University

In July, we were excited to have the opportunity to expand our University Meat Lab program into Iowa through a partnership with Iowa State University. Since August, we have sourced 3,000 pounds of ground beef and ground pork for local food pantries. In August, a large derecho wind storm tore through Iowa and caused extensive damage.



Thanks to our partnership with lowa State, we were able to source 1,700 pounds of ground beef and ground pork and was delivered to Linn County, one of the hardest hit counties by this once in a century storm. We are also honored that Cactus Operations experts have had the opportunity to speak directly to lowa State University

directly to Iowa State University students through Block & Bridle club meetings.




Texas A&M University

The final university to join our University Meat Lab program in 2020 was Texas A&M University. Just since October, Texas A&M has worked with Cactus Cares to supply 300 pounds to the local, on-campus food pantry called the 12th Can. This is a student-run food pantry for fellow students and staff. Prior to partnering with the 12th Can, the only protein options offered to these students and staff were canned or shelf-stable proteins.



To amplify this partnership we have joined forces with the Texas A&M Meat Science and Technology club. We are enthusiastic that this has provided Cactus Operations experts the opportunity to speak directly to Texas A&M University students through their club meetings.

For the 2020-2021 school year, Cactus Cares awarded over \$55,000 to 30 students attending technical or post-secondary school, 100% of all scholarship winners are Cactus employees or their family members.





Increase Communication Expand Programs
